Holy Side Effect

Dear Church,

A new year always catches me by surprise! And somehow it is already February. The Christmas lights are barely down, and it seems as though the church hardly catches its breath before the New Year demands our attention with Very Important Things To Do. Goal-setting and visioning for the year. Building upkeep and caretaking. And of course, the core purposes of pastoral care and worship continue on.

During our Consistory Retreat at the end of January, I wondered if we sometimes put the cart before the horse when it comes to "the business of the church." We are so occupied with keeping the "machine" humming along – which is not a machine at all, but the wonderful and complex and beautiful organism that is the church! – that we sometimes forget to pause and breathe, to pray, and remind ourselves of WHY we do what we do.

Rev. Tracy Barnowe, a UCC pastor, has said that our ultimate goal as a church should not be about the church, but should be scriptural, and guided by Christ.

"Love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (John 13:34).

About this particular scripture, Barnowe writes:

"This is how Jesus loved: with patience, kindness, truth, respect, sanctuary, equality, and nurture of body and spirit... Everything that we do in helping our congregations to grow and thrive must begin with this scriptural foundation.

Some of the results may include more butts in the pews, narrowing the gap in

the budget, filling out our choir, or launching a new ministry in the community. But those are just the outcomes of our goals, the side effects. Everything should stem from our real goals."

As we venture further into 2025, with all the possibility and challenges it holds, my prayer is that we would keep the love of Christ as our guiding light. If we embody that kind of love with one another, everything else is just a holy side effect.


The news around us was worrying and heart-breaking. "What if that was us?" I wondered. "Would I be strong enough?"

Consistory Notes

The Consistory of FRUCC held its retreat Saturday, January 25, 2025 at The Trees in Durham. In addition to Grace McMullen there were seven members in attendance.

Approval of Reports

The December 2024 minutes and the December financial reports were approved. It was noted that the books for 2024 were closed.

Approval was given for a 90-day trial for Laura Horton to host yoga at FRUCC on Mondays.

Ministry Reports

Faith Formation

- The Adult Formation class is doing a study on the book "The Gift of Years" by Joan Chittister is underway on Sunday mornings. Sixteen were present at the first meeting.
- Godly Play helpers received Safe Church Training on January 5. Godly Play Training will be held at FRUCC March 14-16 using Endowment funds. Open to other local churches (would help lower costs). Will need volunteers for lunch to be provided Saturday and Sunday.
- Note: Grace has been the default Faith Formation chair. Hoping someone else can take over the role more consistently.

Fellowship

- Currently in conversation with Derek Smith to take over as committee chair. Will need help recruiting others to join.
- Next Fellowship meal idea is to bring back the Spaghetti Supper. It would be ticketed and open to the community. A date is to be confirmed.

Mission and Outreach

- The Little Food Pantry is being stocked at least four days a week. Currently using budgeted funds to make purchases to restock.
- We are committed to provide lunch for 50+ on three fifth-Thursdays starting on January 30 at 11 a.m. Servers will be needed for each of these.
- There is planning for a Silent Auction fundraiser for SAFE in conjunction with the Spaghetti Supper.

Worship

 Bev Pugh is attending the Alamance Chorale Vocal Workshop at First Baptist Church of Elon on February 1. Workshop focus is vocal health for older singers.

Trustees

Insurance company needs the church to upgrade electrical panels. Quote from King Electric for \$11,775. Congregational vote needed because quote is over \$10,000. Congregational vote set for Sunday, February 9, 2025, after worship service.

Old Business

- Discussion surrounding the Building Superintendent position continues.
- Derek Smith provided an update about cameras.
 Quote approved but not yet installed.
- Derek is also working to complete the Cannon Grant for doors and other repairs. They will reimburse part of the expense. The work must be completed before the grant can be completed and submitted.
- Arleen Widerman noted the need to research a new elevator maintenance company before the contract for Otis Elevators is renewed.

New Business

- Beverly Pugh has forwarded an insurance information request from trustees to the Executive
 Director and YMA Board. Working with YMA
 staff to schedule a time to provide an update on
 the use of the \$50,000 instrument donation.
